As of December 28, 2011:

LAKEFRONT PERCH: More than 100 fishermen caught perch Monday at Navy Pier, which continues to be the hot spot. Arden Katz said minnows and belly meat work as bait. The trick recently has been to fish straight down or under the pier. There's also perch at Montrose and Diversey and in the river around 92nd. In Indiana, the Hole-in-the-Wall was shut by weather Tuesday. When that reopens, it should return to being the most consistent spot.

CENTRAL WISCONSIN: Hooksetter's Guide Service reported outstanding ice fishing in Marathon and Lincoln counties for panfish (3 to 5 feet), big pike (less than 5 feet on tipups) and walleye (night bite).

DELAVAN/GENEVA LAKES, WIS.:

Geneva Lake Bait & Tackle reported a chance of some ice fishing on Como and on the channels of Delavan later this week.

DOWNSTATE: SHELBYVILLE: Michael Sweeney reported walleye going

below the dam on jigs and twisters; best at low light. He said a key is when current is consistent for several days. POWERTON: Open to shore fishing from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

ILLINOIS RIVER: STARVED ROCK AREA: River is clearing and dropping. Time on the Water Outdoors reported good sauger by the bridge right by Barto Landing.

KANKAKEE RIVER: Ed Mullady reported good conditions, but few are trying. He suggested pike at all ditch and bayou mouths, walleye along brush-lined shores or around islands or bridge piers and smallmouth on the edges of faster water.

MADISON LAKES, WIS.: D&S Bait reported spotty ice fishing on parts of Monona Bay (sorting bluegills) and Cherokee Marsh (sorting bluegills, early and late best).

NORTHERN WISCONSIN: EAGLE RIVER: Chamber of Commerce reported ice getting stronger (more than 6 inches), with walleye in 6 to 12 feet outside of weed edges, pike in 10 feet near or around weeds and panfish good. HAYWARD: Pastika's reported decent fishing with ice 5 to 7 inches (have creepers for slick ice). Most smaller lakes are drivable by four-wheelers; on bigger lakes, use caution or stick to bays and shorelines. MINOCQUA: Guide Kurt Justice reported pike and bluegills (on tear-drop jigs in 6 to 10 feet) are very good. Crappie are good but variable in weeds in 8 to 12 feet.

NORTHWEST INDIANA: For perch, see top. Mik-Lurch reported creeks continue to produce good steelhead. There are browns at any warm-water discharge when fishermen can get out. There are reports of walleye around the Port of Indiana.

ST. JOSEPH AREA, MICH.: Tyler Harmon messaged that there is hit-and-miss whitefish and steady steelhead.

SOUTHEAST WISCONSIN LAKEFRONT: Tom Zeman reported outstanding brown action in Milwaukee harbor. Either cast a jig and twistertail or troll copper spoons or body baits. "Any current break, you can jig and get fish," he said. "It is a phenomenal fishery at this time of the year."
